I don't believe it!

Grr! The latest thing winding me up is the repeated use of the word 'loaned' on the radio and television and in newspapers and books. Repeat after me: loan is a noun, lend is a verb. And the past participle of lend is lent!

This was set off by the 6 o'clock news on Radio 4. Nobody's "loaned money to the Labour Party!" They may have lent money – in which case they probably deserve a peerage – but nobody's loaned anyone anything. And on the BBC, too! What is the world coming to?

I know exactly what's happening here. It's those Americans and their insistence on turning nouns into verbs – even when there's already a perfectly good verb available. Grr!

And it's not just British English that's suffering. Subscriber Olaf Schmidt has his own rant to get off his chest.

Letters

I have read quite enthusiastically your essay/editorial about the “sl’rrang of da britesh language” especially grammar. Let me tell that in Germany it is as bad if not worse. Just two examples to make your day.

Ist: Danone (I don’t know if Danone sells products in GB, but it is a big company specialising in milk products, yoghurt and (curd) cheese mostly). This company has done more to the degrading of the German language than any other (perhaps with the exception of Verona Feldbusch). One of their products (“*Fruchtzwerg*” – Fruit Dwarfs) was advertised by children like this:

“... let’s go and buy it, because it is healthy.”

Now that may not sound too horrible. BUT this is a direct translation, including word order, and while “because it is healthy” is okay in English, it is **TOTALLY** wrong in German. “*Weil das ist gesund*” has to be: *weil das gesund ist!* Note: the verb in a subordinate clause is always at the **END!**

So everybody is now using that word order, eg: *weil ich gehe dann ins kino*, instead of: *weil ich dann ins Kino gehe*.

This is only surpassed by the aforementioned woman, Veronica Feldbusch, with her unforgettable “*da werden sie geholfen*” – “there you will gotten help” – right word order, totally wrong tense.

These were merely “advertising jokes,” but even deeper runs the slow conversion of German to Gerlish or *Denglisch* as it is known hereabouts. For example, the all too well known statement of Windows (tm) (r) (whatever):

“*Updates werden gedownloadet*” – “downloading Updates” or “*Ich gehe mal zu Frank, abchillen*” – “I am going to Frank to hang around.”

My estimate is that in 30 years you won’t need to learn German any more as our language will be such an amalgam of English that you can probably work out the meaning by listening just to the English snippets.

Einen schönen day noch! Olaf

Thanks for that, Olaf. Mind you, your description of German in 30 years time sounds rather like what’s already happened to Welsh! The *Académie Française* is fighting a rearguard battle against *le weekend*, *le parking* and so on. And, as I recall, one of the characteristics of Alexander Solzhenitsyn’s writing is that he seeks out archaic Russian words to use in place of neologisms coined from

American (a damn’ good reason to read him in translation, if you ask me). So it’s happening everywhere! Well, all over Europe, anyway.

Mmm, Danone!

Bodegas with Buzz – a tasting event organised by The Wine Society

Right at the end of February Pete Holland, James Guiton and I were joined by a former *En Garde!* player for a civilised evening tasting South American wines at the Guildhall in Winchester. This was far more cultural than the beer festivals I’m used to, with an introduction speech, representatives of the vineyards present to talk about the wines, lots of people in collar and tie – oh, and spittoons. We were advised that the latter are traditionally used only for rinsing out glasses with the bottled water provided on all the tasting tables.

Anyway, after a chip supper, the taste of vinegar needed immediate washing away. Immediacy being of the essence, I made a beeline for the nearest empty table and found myself in conversation with a representative of one of Chile’s organic wine producers, Vinedos Organicos Emiliana. First up, the *Adobe Carmenère 2003*, a clean and sharply fruity red, which cleared away the chippy taste in no time. Nice for £5.25, but I was sure there was better on offer. The rep tempted me with the same vineyard’s *Coyam 2003*. A very oaky red – hardly a surprise, considering Coyam is native Indian for oak. This is a blend of 5 grapes, aged in oak from the Americas and France. Some time has been spent getting this blend right, the result is a good flavour all round the mouth. £9.95 per bottle – but yum!

Time for some white – using the aforementioned spittoon for rinsing first of course. Catena *Chardonnay 2003* from Argentina caught me by surprise as I don’t normally enjoy whites. This was not too sweet, clean-tasting with a rich flavour. Certainly one worth remembering. I moved back to red and the *Ben Marco Expresivo 2003* from the Dominio del Plate vineyard, owned by one of the few women growers in Argentina. Another blend, but predominantly malbec and cabernet sauvignon, this was a good oaky red, but seemed a little pricey at the best part of £13 a bottle. Slightly more down-market, I tried the *Privada 2003* from the Norton producer, a well-established vineyard. More cabernet sauvignon/malbec, this is a soft, well-rounded wine and much better value than the previous, although still £9.95 per bottle. My last Argentinian wine of the night turned out to be Domaine Vistalba’s *Infinitus Cabernet-Merlot 2003*. Vistalba is run by a Frenchman in Patagonia and this fine, fragrant wine turned

out to be the value-for-money bargain of the evening – £5.95 per bottle with savings for bulk buys. This is on my list of must buys.

Back to Chile and white for the next – the *Wine Society's Chilean Sauvignon Blanc, Leyda Valley 2003*. Unfortunately, this wine reaffirmed my views that white wines are best left alone. So, to try some of the newer reds – *Marqués de Casa Concha Merlot, Peumo 2004* and *Terrunyo Syrah 2004* are both from the Concha Y Toro winemakers. The former turned out to be a nicely scented (vanilla, I later learned) wine, creamy in texture and I thought well worth £8.95 a bottle. The latter was a genuinely classy Syrah – a hint of black pepper, tannins softened – lovely, but much pricier at over £10.

Time was running short, so, after re-sampling some earlier favourites, I tried some more expensive wines. Cono Sur is a producer in southern Chile and provided the *Visión Pinot Noir 2004*. A very simple flavour to this one, but rich and velvety and worth considering for laying down at £9. Lastly, two wines from Casa Lapostolle's Apalta vineyard. The *Cuvée Alexandre Merlot 2004* unfortunately fit with Paul Giamatti's view of all merlots in the film *Sideways*. (Less said the better.) However, the *Clos Apalta 2003* – a blend of Merlot, Carmenère and Cabernet Sauvignon – is an absolute masterpiece. Opulent, velvety, ready-to-drink, but will also keep well, this was far and away the quality wine of the evening. Then I checked the price – £432 for a case of 12 ... a little out of my range!

Speeches happened somewhere, but I wasn't very alert and the time was only 8.30 pm. Someone was telling us to go. And I didn't see anyone even spitting... All that remained was time for a very impressive curry (with bottled lager of course) before the train took us home to Southampton.

Entry fee: £22 – but this was a hugely enjoyable night out, with no pressure to buy, just good opportunities to try what was on offer and meet lots of different people. Thanks very much to the Wine Society (a not-for-profit, mutual society devoted to spreading the word of wine) for this event. Science Fiction

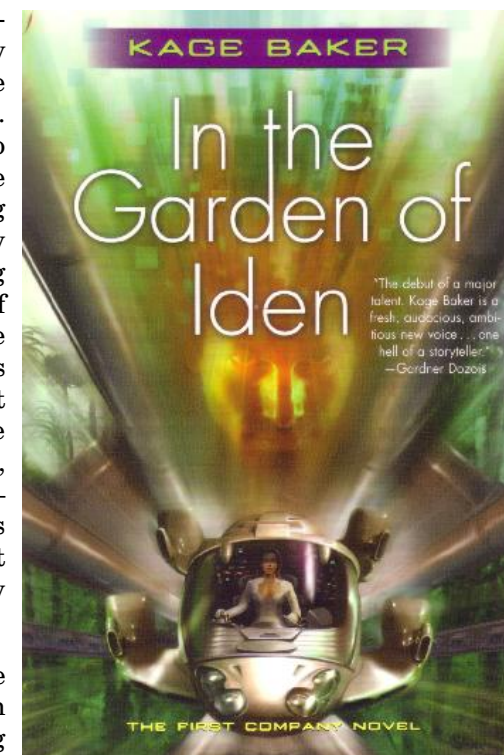
Having said last time that I was going to get hold of Kage Baker's reprinted *In the Garden of Iden*, I thought I had better do so. Amazon did the business and I had the book a few days later. A week after that, I'd read it. I have to say that I was rather surprised. I knew that the "Company" books were about time travel and a secret corps of agents. So I was expecting something fairly technological. Perhaps along the lines of Poul Anderson's *The Corridors of Time*, a book that

captivated me (many years ago) with its mixture of high technology and Dark Ages history. What I got was more like a historical romance. Albeit a historical romance where one of the protagonists is an immortal cyborg!

The book starts with a massive info-dump. Chapter one introduces us very baldly to the Company and how time travel works in Baker's universe. Time travel is limited: you can go into the past, but you can't visit the future. Nor can you move anything into its future. And recorded history can't be changed. So, no shooting Hitler in 1930, but plenty of opportunity to work behind the scenes. You can't rescue the contents of the great library at Alexandria, but you can copy it all. And so the company behind time travel, Dr Zeus, Incorporated, grows very, very rich – all those previously unknown works by da Vinci, Picasso and Rembrandt that turn up after being stored safely over the centuries!

But Dr Zeus doesn't just have time travel, it has immortality: a selection of medical and engineering techniques that can turn a young child into an immortal. Provided they don't mind becoming part machine. So, take the technology back in time and use it on people who are not recorded in history. The Company now has an army of field agents who know advanced technology, know the future history of the world and can act to save all the things that careless mankind will destroy. Thus the Company also has a network of secret bases and travel routes around the planet through the centuries.

This is a fascinating set up. Here you have a band of people who are of their time – or some time earlier – but have the education of someone from the far future. They also have what are almost super-powers and are immortal. Baker doesn't explain what she means by immortality, but implies that these people cannot die. Not just that they won't grow old, but that they are completely unkillable. Think Captain Scarlet.



Enter our heroine. Rescued from the dungeons of the Inquisition in medieval Spain, the young Mendoza (as she's named) is made immortal, educated and trained by the Company. She becomes a botanist, preserving rare plants for posterity. *In the Garden of Iden* is about Mendoza's first mission. A trip to mid-sixteenth century England – part of the Spanish influx that accompanies Queen Mary's marriage to the heir to the Spanish throne. Here, she is to identify – and preserve – plants from a botanical garden set up by one Sir Walter Iden. Sir Walter gets some advanced medical treatment in payment – cloaked as alchemical mumbo-jumbo, of course.

The story is strong on life in the sixteenth century and how it compares with modern conveniences. Every now and then, the reader is reminded that the characters are people out of time. Their interests are the 'latest' film release (on the equivalent of DVD) and the news on the networks maintained by the Company (and, of course, completely inaccessible to the 'natives'). At the same time, this is a turbulent period of English history and the characters are very aware of how historical events are influencing what's going on around them.

I found a few jarring notes within the story, but it is quite compelling – even though much of it is mundane. Perhaps this is its strength, seeing how these exotic immortals cope with everyday surroundings. I was certainly captivated, despite it being rather different from what I expected. Not a tale of derring-do, but the story of a (rather extraordinary) young woman discovering who she is. And that she is a human being after all. Baker tells a good story that involves the reader right the way through and doesn't pull any punches. *In the Garden of Iden* is an impressive story and a great start to a series. I shall certainly move on to the other books and I suggest you give this one a try.

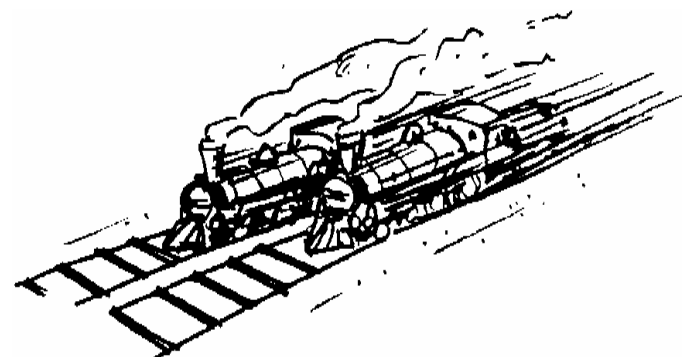

What's this about?

Devised by Chris Boote, *Easy Money* is a game for all readers of *To Win Just Once* – **if your name isn't in the list above, let me know and I'll add you in.** The game takes 12 turns, the winner being whoever has the most money (not including the value of shares) at the end of the game.

There are four tradable stocks (red, blue, green, yellow) plus black, which never changes price. All stocks start at a price of 10p per share. Players start with 100p money and one of each tradable stock.

Each turn, each player must bid to buy or sell a number of shares in one colour of stock (except Black). A Buy bid is limited to the highest number of shares the player can afford at the current price. The price of the stock rises by 1p for each share in bids to buy and falls by 1p for each share in bids to sell. Players' sales and purchases take place after making these adjustments. The price of a stock cannot fall below 1p.

If a player can't afford to buy their shares at the new price or fails to make any bid or tries to sell shares they don't have (or anything else that invalidates their bid), then they buy a black share. Should a player not be able to afford a black share, they buy one for all their remaining money (even if they have 0 money, they get a black share). Players are out of the game if they own four black stocks. They are also out if they have no money and no tradable stocks.

Their Business Connections increased from 2 to 3 and they purchased 2 more Isotope Factories and 1 Spice Factory on Sigma Draconis. Their Reputation rose steadily on their advertising campaign and the revitalised Corporation is doing well.

SOLAR WINDS TRADING COMPANY accepted that it had built a Factory at Alpha Centauri and sent its ship there to collect the goods. CAESAR WHOLESALE INC. delivered their passenger at Alpha Centauri and found him suitably grateful. They increased their Criminal Connections too.

TRANS SOLAR TRADING INC restarted their Passenger fleets criss-crossing the sector, but found that they have competition nowadays.

SOLAR SPICE, MONOPOLES AND LIQUOR did a private trade with SWISS MERCENARY for 12 Liquors at Alpha Centauri, apparently involving a substantial Consultancy fee to the Helvetian Chairman.

HONEST DARTH’S QUALITY USED SPACE SHIPS bought a new Warehouse at Delta Toucanis, and increased their Political Connections. ZWILLINGE sold the passenger pod from Doppelganger for more lucrative Cargo Pods, and bought a Warehouse at Sigma Draconis.

VOGON INDUSTRIES sold their slaves at Gamma Leporis, bought 3 new Alloy Factories there and launched their new ship, Death, at Tau Ceti. Though ferociously named, it has Cargo pods and an A class crew. Finally ISKANDER FIRE AND ACCIDENT sold the Passenger pod from Trust, upgraded the crew to A class and added a Passenger pod to complete the vessel.

Trading was brisk on some systems this quarter. At Gamma Leporis ISKANDER bought 7 Alloys for 3 HTs each and gained a Contractorship. There was still enough left for TRANSURRANIC to buy 3 more at the rock bottom price of 1 HT. Epsilon Eridani had ZWILLINGE selling 2 Isotopes for 7 HTs and SOLAR SPICE, LIQUORS & MONOPOLES sold 12 Monopoles for 12 HTs apiece to get a Dealership.

No one was trading at Delta Toucanis, which was a shame as the blockading fleet had moved away.

At Tau Ceti, ISKANDER FIRE & ACCIDENT sold 4 Alloys at a price of 9 HTs, TRANSURRANIC bought 6 isotopes for 4 HTs each and gained a Contractorship and then ZWILLINGE sold 12 Petroleum for 9 HTs apiece and a Dealership.

Mu Herculis saw ZWILLINGE selling 8 Isotopes for 10 HTs each and a further Dealer’s position. SSLM sold 5 Monopoles on Contract and ISKANDER bought 9 Petroleum at the price of 9 HTs and took a Contractor’s position for themselves.

SSLM bought 5 Spice on Contract at Sigma Draconis as the price dropped. ISKANDER disposed of a single Petroleum for 9 HTs and bought 6 Isotopes for 6 HTs. But NEIKAN-DU had already bought 10 Isotopes for 7 HTs and gained a Dealer’s position. VOGON INDUSTRIES found themselves disposing of 5 Units of Isotopes on Contract at a much better price than they can have expected.

ISKANDER sold 5 Isotopes for 8 HTs each at Alpha Centauri, but spent more buying 5 Liquors at 11 HTs apiece.

Beta Hydri saw TRANSURRANIC selling 6 Alloys for 4 HTs each and taking a Dealership. HONEST DARTH’s used their Market Managership to sell 8 Isotopes at the rate of 11 HTs. SSLM sold 2 Spice on Contracts as the price crept up.

Factories are built in Systems where a commodity is abundant – see the table bottom of page 17 in the rules. You can't build a Liquor factory at Mu Herculis, for example.

Players who took out loans on the first turn have to repay them by the end of next turn. You repay the loan before you get your Reputation bonus, if any.

A ship laid down in Turn 6, will be launched in Turn 7. It can only Hyperjump in turn 8. You can load it with passengers in turn 7, and goods, if you had a warehouse to store the goods in on turn 7.

I don't update the Market Positions table every turn. In future I will put the turn it was updated on it.

Corporation F, Semper Durus, was eliminated this turn, both for being unable to pay its debts (ships are sold for just 50 HTs if in space) and for failing an Inquiry. (Rules 22.7, 22.8) Firing on ships reduced its Reputation to 0 and it stayed there until the Inquiry phase, which went badly.

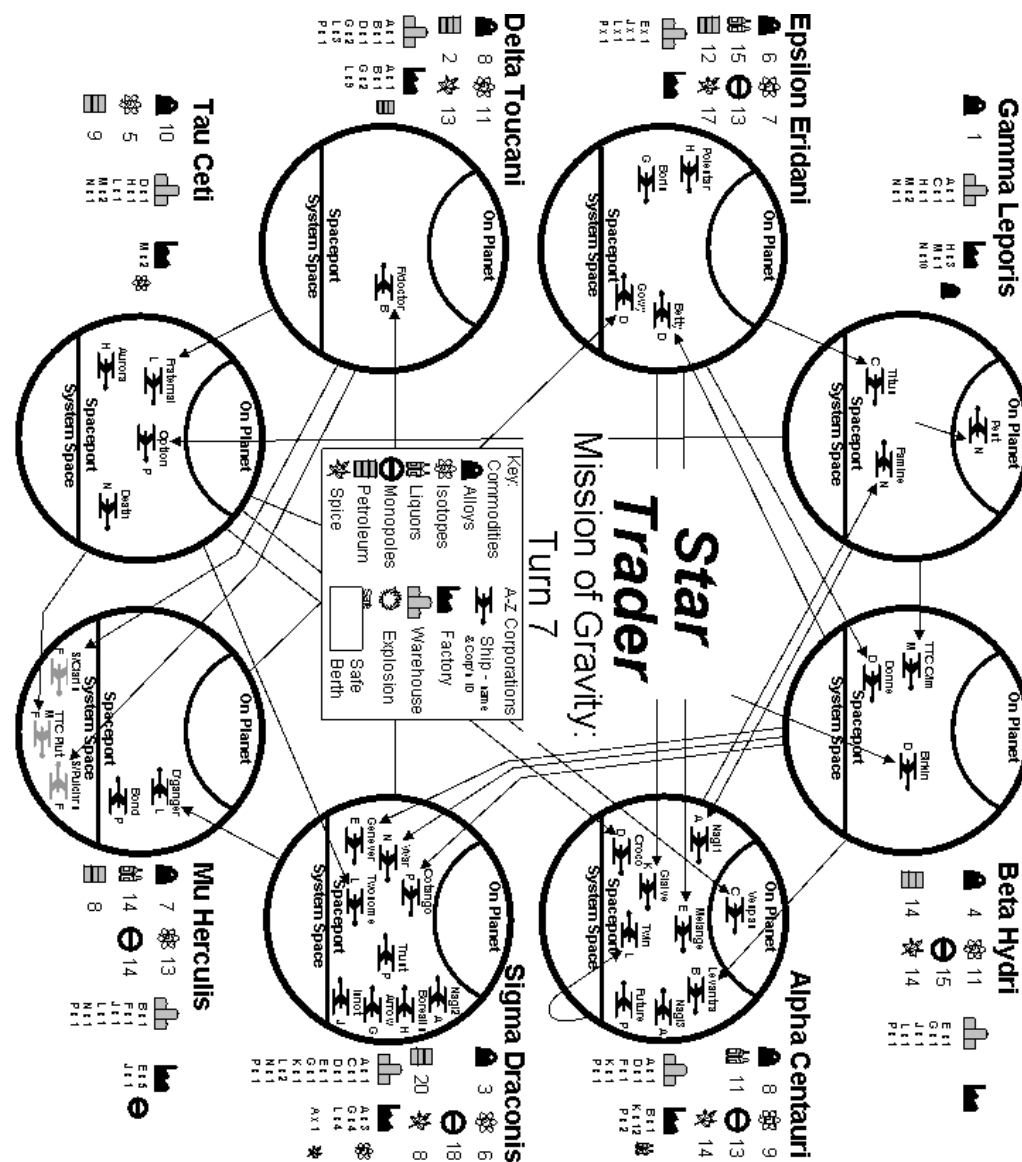

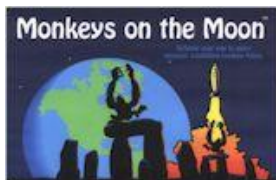

August 1659

It's definitely summer in Paris and the city slumbers in the sunshine for most of the month. The long days mean an early start for those getting up at dawn for furtive assignations. But that only affects Beppe de Marko and Devlin Carnate this month. Oddly for a cavalryman, Carnate uses a Rapier, while de Marko's weapon is a sabre. The two men are slightly built and a pretty even match. De Marko has the advantage of being more skilled with his blade than Carnate is with his. De Marko goes for the surprise option and lunges furiously with the blunt point of his sabre. This doesn't do much damage, only just breaking the skin. Carnate jumps aside to inspect the damage. He backs further off and avoids de Marko's follow-up cut. Despite his lower expertise, Carnate is able to get in a lunge while de Marko is still recovering his balance. This blow is too much for de Marko and he concedes the fight.

Who'd be an Aide?

As the campaign enters its last month there is some last minute jockeying for position in the military. Euria Humble uses his influence on the Adjutant to First Division, but fails to get him to resign. However, it only takes the application of money for Humble to make himself Colonel of the Dragoon Guards. The now vacant Lieutenant-Colonel's slot is purchased by Antoine Valois. Beau Romir and Orson de Combat join forces to persuade the Heavy Brigadier to quit. But Omi Palone throws his weight behind the Brigadier and this is just enough to

convince him to stay in the job. Not that it matters, as the one applicant for the job, Leo Nonmie, no longer has the rank for it.



Lieutenant-Generals Stan Dandy Liver and Rene Ouai both ask their Aides to resign. Liver succeeds, but Ouai doesn't. Neither has anyone else lined up for the job though. Roland Pollee d'Eaulee turns down the chance to be Aide to Orson de Combat in favour of the similar offer from Revaulvin d'Or. Unfortunately, d'Or already has an Aide, so d'Eaulee can't have the job. Similarly, the increasingly absent-minded Co W Ard Extrême tries to make Rob d'Masses his Aide. D'Masses fancies the job, but so does the incumbent.

The one success is Beau Romir's application to take over as Aide to the Crown Prince. His application is backed by Gaston de St Marque and Stan Dandy Liver, making his success certain. Romir takes over his new role with pleasure – even though he's at the front and the post lapses at the end of August.

Several new recruits sign up for the last month of the campaign. Jean-Paul Georgenringeau is turned down by Phresh Face, Magnon de Sources and new Colonel Devlin Carnate for the Royal Marines, Picardy Musketeers and Princess Louisa Light Dragoons, respectively. He is finally accepted into the 27th Musketeers, where he buys the rank of Captain and joins the regiment in action. Marc Desade enlists with the 53rd Fusiliers, buys a Captaincy and stays in Paris. The Crown Prince Cuirassiers enrol Dancer Sous le Pond'Avignon. He'd like to be a Major, but his social standing will only take him as far as Captain. The new Captain saddles his horse and heads for the front. Colonel Dan de Lyon accepts Lucien de la Rue into the Queen's Own Carabiniers. De la Rue is content to be a humble trooper and also sets off for the battle.

Wine and ... song

There really aren't that many socialites left in Paris. But Stan Dandy Liver keeps his end up by acting the host at the Fleur de Lys. He is in the club all month with Kathy Pacific at his side and has invited several others to join him at specific times in August. Beppe de Marko and Katy Did are in the Fleur all month too. As are Revaulvin d'Or and Bette Noire, though only on their own membership for the first three weeks. Co W Ard Extrême turns up on his own after his first week's shenanigans. He visited the Bawdyhouses and tried to wave away the wine that was brought to him. He was firmly reminded that drinking is obligatory and relieved of sufficient crowns to pay for his refreshment. This left him without the cash to pay for the female company he'd visited the place to get!

But let us return to the details of Stan and Kathy's guests. The start of the month is the busiest point. Devlin Carnate rolls up with Angelina di Griz on his arm. Rob d'Masses and Lotte Bottle follow. Jean René Gratrien is unaccompanied, as are new boys Michael l'Ovnotwore and Pierre de Vin Blanc. As most of these have no regimental affiliation, there are no confrontations during the week. Stan and Kathy are left alone the following week. Marc Desade appears in week three. The end of August sees Mad Morty arrive, escorted by Belle Epoque. Finally, Revaulvin and Bette make their move from members to guests and Toady to Stan and Kathy.

After their visit to Stan at the Fleur, Devlin and Angelina move on to their own club, Bothwell's. They stay there for the rest of the month. Similarly Rob d'Masses and Lotte head for Blue Gables, where they spend the next three weeks. Marc Desade moves around rather more. He starts August in his club, Red Phillips. He chances his hand with the ladies before attending on Stan in the Fleur. No luck there, so he has to Toady on his own. Feeling the lack of female company, Marc heads for the bawdyhouses and the "ladies of negotiable affection." Shame he doesn't take enough money with him to be able to afford one of the ladies.

We've already mentioned that Co W Ard Extrême visited the red light district. Other visitors – at separate times – are Pierre de Vin Blanc and Michael l'Ovnotwore. Michael is another man who's failed in his courting attempt, but both of them get the female company they need. Pierre then goes courting. He perseveres after an initial refusal and is successful at the end of the month. That's one way to spend the money he borrowed from the Shylocks – though he had a gift from Euria Humble as well. Michael completes his August in the gym for a week's practice with his rapier. Jean-René Gratrien also goes courting. He calls on several women, but fails to attract any of them. This just leaves Mad Morty, who practises for three weeks with a two-handed sword before partying at the Fleur with Stan and Kathy.



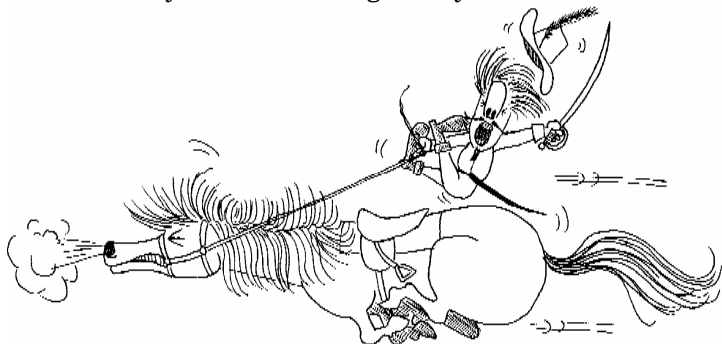
Behind the Arras

First Army continues the siege of Arras. Frontier Division (and the volunteers) maintains the encirclement while the Cavalry Division covers the surrounding countryside to intercept any reinforcements. Brigadier-General Orson de Combat takes over as acting commander of the Cavalry Division. He decides to swap the two Brigades between flanks so that they can have some different scenery. His innovative approach gets him a Mention in Despatches and 400 crowns in loot.

DG Colonel Euria Humble takes over de Combat's position with the Horse Guards Brigade as acting Brigadier. He sends both regiments out on regular sweeps. His reward is promotion to (brevet) Bdr-General and 150 crowns from this month's plunder. His Brigade Major, DG Lt-Colonel Antoine Valois backs up his new boss (same as his old boss!). He isn't recognised but dips his hand into the pot for some 200 crowns worth of booty. Deprived of its senior officers, the Dragoon Guards regiment displays no initiative this month and heads back to camp every time it encounters any resistance.

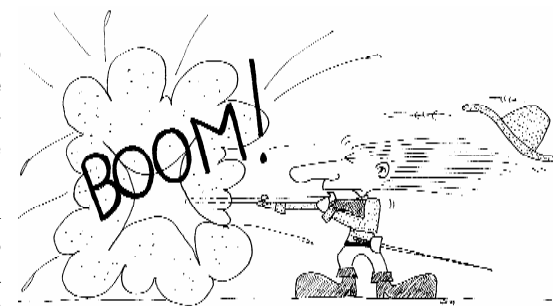
The Queen's Own Carabiniers are more aggressive. The acting commander, Major Dexteur Facteur, leads the men to counter a Spanish probe – probably aimed at finding a weak spot through which to relieve the town. The QOCs see off the attacking Spanish cavalry in short order. Major Facteur's bravery gains him a Mention in Despatches and he gets 600 crowns for ransoming a captured junior officer. Fellow Major Auray Enri isn't quite so brave. His only reward is some 500 crowns in loot. There is a Mention for Captain Jean Laissez Faire, whose war whoops are credited with disconcerting the enemy. Brevet Subaltern Roland Pollee d'Eaulee is promoted to full Subaltern. And trooper Lucien de la Rue is brevetted to Subaltern. It's slow progress at the bottom of the regiment.

On the other flank, it's a quiet month for the Heavy Brigade. Colonel Horatio d'Escargot leads Archduke Leopold's Cuirassiers. His heart doesn't seem to be in it, but he is promoted to (brevet) Bdr-Gen. A little loose change (say 50 crowns) comes his way as well, but it's small beer compared to what he borrows from RFG Captain Lun a'Tic. Lt-Colonel Thomas Tudo tries to egg on his superior. His initiative is Mentioned in Despatches. The Crown Prince Cuirassiers are under strength after two months of fighting (and the cashiering of its commander). Captain Dancer Sous le Pond'Avignon is in command of second squadron, despite being a new recruit to the regiment. On patrol, he spots a Spanish force heading away from Arras. Despite the advice of his staff sergeant, he orders his men into a charge across a nice grassy hillside. His horse trips over one of the many rabbit holes and throws le Pond'Avignon headfirst into the ground. His neck snaps on impact. RIP. The enemy makes a clean getaway.



Going out with a bang

Lt-General Rene Ouai decides that it's not worth trying to assault Arras and has the Frontier Division simply maintain the siege. What's left of the Spanish garrison breaks out, routing Frontier regiment 3 on the way. Frontier regiment 1 is also in the path of the attack and takes casualties. Frontier Private



Leo Nonmie (former commander of the CPCs) has dug himself a nice little foxhole and is perfectly safe inside it. Frontier regiment 2 is away from the attack and Private Pas de Nom ('X6') discovers that no-one's shooting at him when he sits on the ramparts. He is Mentioned in Despatches. The garrison makes its getaway across country in good order, despite being spotted by elements of the CPCs.

With the last soldiers gone, the town surrenders to the French troops. The Guards Brigade is ordered into the town and the King's Musketeers lead the way and start the looting. Commander Zachary The Money Goes receives a Mention in Despatches and 300 crowns. His Lt-Colonel, Fernand Louis Adelmo de Gaulle, takes the unusual step of shortening his stirrups by a couple of inches, a practice that is banned from the parade ground. However, on the battlefield it improves his reach, allowing him to "hit the enemy first." He lines his pockets with over a thousand crowns worth of booty. As he can't be promoted, he gets two Mentions in Despatches ("looks like a bloody jockey," "excellent control one-handed"). Senior Major Omi Palone finally gets the money he's been looking for all season: 800 crowns of goodies. Junior Major Walter Butts collects just a hundred crowns less and gets his name into the Despatches twice.

The Royal Foot Guards are trying to keep up with their commander, who has disappeared into the town. Following the scent of fine brandy, they find him surrounded by barrels – mostly empty by now – smoking his pipe. "Good to see you chaps," slurs Colonel Alfonse Qué Holique. He hiccoughs, lurches to his feet, grins inanely and knocks the embers out of his pipe on the rim of a barrel. Woomph! The Foot Guards duck as a pale blue flame rockets out of the barrel and spreads rapidly across the ground. To the barrels that Holique hasn't drunk. The ones marked 'Gunpowder.' A resounding explosion marks the end of the Royal Foot Guards' commander (and Chancellor of the Exchequer). RIP. Holique's will sees large sums of money going to the Minister of Justice (Revaulvin d'Or), Minister of War (Stan Dandy Liver) and Minister of State (Lokwot Isaw), though there is little to say how the Chancellor came by all this.

Badly shaken, Lt-Colonel Lokwot Isaw gathers what loot he can: it comes to just under 500 crowns. Major Averell de Alton forgets the plunder in favour of securing the barracks. He is Mentioned in Despatches. Captains Beau Romir and Lun a'Tic pick up some cash: 300 and 400 crowns, respectively.

The Cardinal's Guard follow up and complete the mission. Colonel Ced Deucer is brevetted to Brigadier-General, but there's no reward for Major Lucien d'Escaille-huitaillements. The Guards Brigadier, Lt-Gen Charlemagne le Gosse does well out of all this. Taking personal charge of the town, he is Mentioned twice in the Despatches. This is a privileged position. Privileged in this case to the tune of a thousand crowns. The one senior casualty is Brigade Major Marc de Zorro. Confronted by a Spanish officer, de Zorro insists on taking him on in single combat. Unfortunately, the Spaniard is the better swordsman. RIP de Zorro. Division commander Rene Ouai enters the town in triumph and rakes 700 crowns off the top of the pot.

A successful conclusion to the siege means it's been a good campaign for First Army commander Sean Sondamour. Though his two Mentions in Despatches for this month are more like footnotes. There is also a Mention in Despatches for his Adjutant, QOC Colonel Dan de Lyon. De Lyon is promoted to (brevet) Bdr-Gen as well. Sondamour's Aide, PM Colonel Magnon de Sources, is also Mentioned. And brevetted to Bdr-Gen. And Knighted – which raises his social standing. So it's definitely been a good month for him!

Marines don't climb trees

Second Army covers First Army's rear and lines of communication. Once again, there is no serious action, just a few reconnaissance attacks from small enemy forces. General Gaston de St Marque is disappointed (as he has been all season) not to see more action, but consoled by the thought of being Field Marshal from next month. Two Mentions in Despatches don't go amiss either. With limited opportunities for looting, there's only 300 crowns for him this month.

As commander of the Royal Marines, Lt-Col Phresh Face feels it is his duty to train the new recruits in the skills needed by the Marines. This month: firing from a fighting top. There being a lack of tall ships in the vicinity, the adaptable Face shins up a pine tree to demonstrate. He discovers, however, that trees aren't built as sturdily as ships' masts. There is a loud crack followed by a series of yelps and crashes as the Lt-Colonel bounces off branches on the way down and a



nasty thud as he hits the bottom. None of the blows is fatal on its own, but the cumulative effect is. RIP.

First Foot Brigadier Jacques Shitacks rolls his eyes at the news and duly reports that his Brigade has lost another senior officer. It's not clear quite how he expresses this, but he ends up with two Mentions in Despatches and 350 crowns. There's a Mention, too, for the First Division commander, Lt-Gen Gar de Lieu. He is brevetted to General – hotting up the competition for the one Army command available next month – and sticks 250 crowns in his pocket.

The 27th Musketeers are on the receiving end of a Spanish attack. Faced with charging cavalry, new Captain Jean-Paul Georgenringeau knows his duty. Clamping his eyes shut, he stands firm, exhorting his men to stand beside him. All alone, he falls beneath the enemy sabres. RIP. Third Foot Brigadier Pierre de Mont-Réal orders the 4th Arquebusiers to back up their colleagues and they stem the tide. De Mont-Réal is promoted to (brevet) Lt-General and Knighted. (Boosting his social standing quite effectively.) Two Mentions in Despatches for Second Division commander Joseph de Veevre means he, too, receives a Knighthood. ❖
