Happy New Year!

Earworms

Last month it was Christmas carols, natch. “O Come all ye Faithful” in particular. I managed to avoid Wham!ageddon right up until “Last Christmas” featured in the GCHQ advent calendar puzzles. Sigh.

This month it’s been the Eurythmics “Angel” which popped up as incidental music in a TV programme and I’ve not been able to shake since.

’Tis the season

There’s nothing much to add to my 2025 mince pie reviews. I didn’t get to try the Waitrose ones that Which? had top of their list, so ended up sticking with the Sainsbury’s bakery offerings.

Oh, and what do I see the first time I go into Sainsbury’s in the new year? A huge display of hot cross buns! Only three months early.

Beery Advent

Last issue had the highlights from the first 40% of my advent calendar, so here’s what I’ve picked out from the remainder (it did take me until the new year to finish them off). There were an awful lot of pale yellow, hazy, hoppy beers usually called “*adjective* Pale Ale” to drink, but I managed.



Choc-work Orange (5% alcohol by volume) from Outland, a craft beer brand from Hall and Woodhouse (aka Badger – www.badgerbeers.com) whose beers were a formative part of my beer drinking). It's a nice-looking stout with a definite chocolate nose. The taste is chocolate and then there's a real tang, which could be orange, as it goes down. Lovely: 9, though I'm tempted to deduct half a point for the groan-worthy name.

S189#14 (4% abv), a craft lager from Williams Brothers (williamsbrosbrew.com) in Alloa (Scotland). Apparently, it's the fourteenth recipe from their S-189 yeast. It looked like a Pilsner, it smelled like a Pilsner and it tasted like one. A surprisingly tasty Pilsner, without the harshness they often have. If I have to drink Pilsner, this would be my choice: 8/10.



Barghest (4.3%), a stout from Ossett Brewery (ossett-brewery.co.uk) in Yorkshire. Dark brown in the glass with a smoky, roasted aroma. It tasted smoky, too, with maybe some chocolate as well. And very dry: 8/10.

Auntie Flaunty (6%), a "Hopfenweisse" from Brothers in Law Brewing (www.brothersinlawbrewing.nl) in Utrecht. Yes, it's pale yellow and hazy. But it's a wheat beer. With lots of hops. So the aroma is wheat beer, with the hoppiness underneath. And the taste, again, was dry and hoppy. Very nice – that's a 9.



Wee Heavy (7.5%), a heavy from Wiper and True (wiperandtrue.com) in Bristol. Dark brown in the glass with a flat head, it smells of malt and caramel. That's the rich taste, too, with a hint of sweetness as it goes down. I'd not tried a heavy before (it's a traditional Scottish beer style), but I'll certainly be drinking it again: 8.

And, last in the box, Crimes Against Brewing (8%), a chocolate fudge sundae pastry stout (no, really!) from Neon Raptor Brewing Co (neonraptorbrewingco.com) in Nottingham. I got lots of chocolate and some coffee in the aroma and chocolate and vanilla in the taste. Yummy, but so rich I was glad it wasn't in a larger can: 8.

That's a total of ten excellent beers in the 24, with 13 very drinkable ones and one which will remain anonymous.

Online stats

I got *TWJO* 260 out on 20th December and the PDFs were downloaded 134 times in the rest of the month. December saw 85 downloads for the PDFs of *TWJO* 259, making 213 in six weeks or so. And issue 258 was downloaded 47 times for a total of 270 since publication.

I mentioned last issue that I got to see the Saw Doctors on their 2025 end-of-year tour, after missing them in 2024. Nephew Tom joined me for the evening.

Unlike 2023, when I last saw them, the band had some support this time. This was Noelle McDonnell, who's part of the Saw Doctors these days (and is also from their home town of Tuam, just rather younger!). He gave us some of his own material. This was unfamiliar songs, of course, but I could see these being performed by the whole band. Who knows?

After a decent interval the stage lights went down and the boys came on to the Superman theme, which I found amusing. When the lights came up, the audience was hit by a wall of guitars (okay, one was a mandolin) across the stage and then by a wall of noise as they launched into "World of Good" (as quoted in last issue.)

And we were off into a fine selection of the Saw Doctors' repertoire, with a sprinkling of new songs. This was something they didn't have in 2023 and suggests renewed enthusiasm from the old dogs (they're only a few years younger than me!). I certainly felt they were more energetic on stage – one of the things that attracted me to the band in the first place was their energy on stage – possibly helped by having a couple of younger guys in the line-up.

The audience (including Tom and me) was singing along to most of the songs (some older stuff was unfamiliar to Tom – "Presentation Boarder", for example), but went into overdrive for "I Useta Lover", their biggest hit (with its unforgettable opening line: "I have fallen for another, she can make her own way home"). Followed by the gymnastics of "Tommy K" and one of my favourites, "Red Cortina". And "N17" wrapped up the set. Tom and I were surprised they hadn't left this for the encore.

When they did come back on the third song was one that should be familiar to all my readers: "To Win Just Once". Another great anthem that got everybody going again. The band has the habit of covering a 1960s number in the middle of their encore. In the past this has been "Downtown", but this time we had "Waterloo Sunset", led by Anto Thistlethwaite. Brilliant! And they finally wrapped up with "Hay Wrap" ("Bale 'em. Bale 'em, Hay! Hay!"), probably their silliest song ever.



Oh, the Green and Red of Mayo!, I can see it still, its soft and craggy boglands, it's tall majestic hills, where the ocean kisses Ireland and the waves caress its shore and the feeling it came over me to stay for evermore... for evermore! (Cue sax...)

Much as I love the Saw Doctors' music, you have to see them live to get the full impact. With extra guitars in the line-up, I felt they were a bit 'heavier' this time – noticeable, in particular, on "Clare Island" – and Tom agreed. Mind you, when I first saw them, back in 1991, I reckoned there was a punk edge to their performance. Over the years more traditional Irish/folk influences have come in (I suspect ex-Waterboy Mr Thistlethwaite may have contributed to this) – Wikipedia even describes the band as "folk-rock". Or maybe they've just mellowed.

Completing the Austrians

Pevans and Evert finish off the expansion

Specifically, the *Austrian Army* expansion to *Commands & Colors: Napoleonics*. Long-term readers will know that I'm a fan of the *Commands & Colors* family, particularly *Napoleonics*. I have been playing the different expansions for this game with my regular opponent, Evert, for some time. (We play online, using Vassal – www.vassalengine.org – and aim for a game a week.)

There are 20 scenarios in the Austrian expansion and we play each twice, swapping sides for the second game, so that's 40 games in all. (Because the scenarios are not balanced, playing both sides and combining the scores evens this out.) With interruptions for holidays (and other real-life events), it actually took us 16 months to complete the Austrian scenarios.

The final scenario is the third covering the Battle of Wagram in April 1809 and focuses on Davout's attack on the Austrian left on the second day of the battle. Here's the set-up (from CommandsAndColors.net):



The French (blue) are at the bottom of the picture, the Austrians (off-white) at the top. The river that crosses the battlefield can be forded. While either player holds a majority of the town hexes (outlined) they have victory banners: one for the Austrians, three for the French. The French also get one for occupying the Stone Tower (centre) and a banner for each unit while it's on the Austrian side of the blue line. The Austrians start with the banner for Markgrafneusiedl and 12 are needed for victory.

Historically, the Austrians attacked first, but Davout's men rode this out and then attacked the Austrian defensive positions on the hills behind Markgrafneusiedl. In game terms, it looks like the French could easily score a lot of banners for getting units onto the hills, so my Austrians will have to defend hard. (Tricky when they run away quickly and advance slowly!)

After initial skirmishing, first blood went to the Austrians when a lone French Line infantry attacked the lower part of Markgrafneusiedl and fell to its opposite number in the town. That makes the score 2:0 to me with the banner for holding the majority of the town.

Evert continued to attack on the left of the battlefield only to lose another French line to the defenders' muskets: 3:0.

Then the French cavalry cut loose on the right (Evert played a "Cavalry Charge"), taking out an Austrian Cuirassier and General Nostitz. That's 3:2.



Apart from the initial set-up, the pictures are saved from our game on Vassal. Ordered units are shown by an elliptical shadow below them. Lines show units' movements, yellow circles show the attacking unit, red the latest target and blue those that have already attacked - or can't. And you can see the victory banners along the top and bottom edges.)

As the cavalry battle continued a French Light cavalry fell, then two Austrian Light to make the score 4:4. A "Rally" card let me recover one Austrian cavalry to eliminate an opposing Heavy cavalry and restore some infantry to finish off the damaged French Line infantry on the bridge (left of centre). That's me back in the lead 6:4, but there's very little left on the Austrian left flank.

Evert pressed the French attack on the left again, only for me to use a "Bayonet Charge" to counter-attack and remove a French Line (7:4) The French artillery took out an Austrian Line in exchange. (7:5) And my guys got another French unit, while the Austrian cavalry put the last French infantry on the left into square. (8:5)

Time for the French cavalry to get back in the act: they eliminated the Austrian Horse artillery as they moved into the centre. (8:6) However, the Austrian muskets took out the Light cavalry. And Gen Montbrun. (10:6)

The French attacked across the battlefield (“Forward” is such a useful card). On the right, the French cavalry removed the last Austrian cavalry. Infantry from the centre attacked the town and, with artillery support from the left, eliminated the French infantry holding it and moved in. The French also got a victory banner for their cavalry on the hills while the Austrians lost one for no longer having the majority of the town. This evens up the score at 9:9.

In turn the Austrian infantry re-took the town, eliminating the French unit there, and chased the French cavalry off the hills – 10:8. Evert pushed infantry forward in the centre and took out an Austrian infantry. (10:9) But I reclaimed the banner for the town and removed one of those advanced French units to win 12:9.



Phew! That was quite a fight: 28 turns in just under two hours. And a week later we re-convened for the re-match and my turn to play the French.

My starting hand contained two “Cavalry Charge” cards, an “Assault Right” and an “Attack Right”. So of course I flung the French cavalry on the right flank against their opposite numbers. First blood to me and the score is 1:1 (Evert has one for holding the majority of the town).



But the Austrian horsemen fought back! Some lucky dice took out General Montbrun as well as his Light cavalry and it's 1:3.

My second “Cavalry Charge” took out two more Austrian Light cavalry (3:3), only for Evert to move up some Light infantry (!) to finish off a Heavy cavalry (3:4). I continued to push forward with the cavalry, but lost the other Heavy cavalry and Gen Grouchy. That's now 3:6.



Evert flung infantry from the centre forward with some joining the fight on the right, eliminating another French cavalry (3:7) and forcing the last one to retreat.

Time for the French infantry to get into it. Attacking centre right with a “Bayonet Charge” eliminated two Austrian infantry: 5:7.



Continuing their attack in the centre, the French infantry took out an Austrian Light infantry (6:7) and occupied the church (in the centre), albeit with a very damaged unit. In response the Austrian infantry eliminated a French Line right of centre (6:8), followed by two more as they re-took the church (ignoring my combined arms attack on the right). At least Gen Friant escaped. That puts the score to 6:10 and it's looking grim.

Feeling confident now, a “Bayonet Charge” saw the Austrian infantry take the offensive. This removed a French Line at the cost of a Militia unit (charging regular troops?!). 7:11 and it's nearly over.

Finishing off an Austrian Line in the centre and having some Cuirassiers behind the Austrian lines took the score to 9:11. But a sudden attack on the left saw battered French Light infantry succumb to Austrian muskets: 9:12 and it's all over in another Austrian win.



That was 28 turns (exactly the same as last time) of a hard battle that took just over two hours – a bit longer than last time. And the aggregate scores? A draw at 21:21! (Our second draw.)

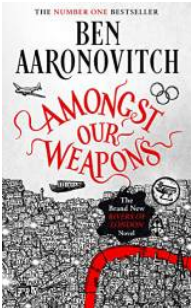

And that's all 20 of the Austrian scenarios played – 40 games in total. Of those 40 games, I won 21 and Evert 19. Looks like we're pretty evenly matched. However, looking at the aggregate scores for the 20 scenarios, I won 11 to Evert's 7 with 2 draws. I guess I do better than Evert when I lose a battle!

Reading Matter

I've just finished novel number 9 in Ben Aaronovitch's “Rivers of London” series, *Amongst Our Weapons* (go back to TWJO 250 for my thoughts on the previous one). Hmm, I thought, is he referring to... Then I spotted the section titles: “Surprise...”, “Fear...”, “Ruthless efficiency...”. Yes, it's an extended Monty Python reference – one of the characters even says, “I wasn't expecting that!” later in the book.

The plot starts with a dead body. A dead body with a hole through its body where its heart used to be. And, when our apprentice police wizard Peter Grant



investigates, definite signs of magic being used. The dead person turns out to have been looking for a ring. A magical ring, apparently. And not only that, it's one of a set of seven (cue *Lord of the Rings* reference – by the characters).

Peter's police enquiries are thus hunting a killer, while his magical enquiries are finding the rings and working out what they do. Luckily, the two overlap considerably. As well as this, Peter has the imminent arrival of his twins on his mind. His heavily-pregnant partner, Beverley Brook, is making arrangements for the big day, which will definitely involve other rivers of London...

As usual, the book is an entertaining romp, mixing the magical with the police procedural (nay, bureaucratic – Aaronovitch has a good line in the policeman's paperwork lot) and the personal. And Peter, being Peter, is not only trying to solve the case, but to save everybody involved as well. I was a bit surprised to find the talking foxes appearing so often, but other characters re-appear as well.

One of the reasons I enjoy these books is that Aaronovitch's London is one I recognise. This time he's rude about Great Eastern Street, which amused me as I worked in an office there 1999-2001 (it's the only place I've worked where the taxis arriving in the evening were not picking up workers going home, but delivering people to the bars and clubs – that's Hoxton for you). This story even has Peter leave London to go 'up North' – something he manages without the apparent trauma incurred the first time he left the city (in book 5, *Foxglove Summer*).

I've worked out one of the reasons I find it hard to stop reading these books. Aaronovitch ends his chapters on cliffhangers. Which means I just have to continue to the next one to see what happens. I wonder if this is something transferred from his TV scripting days? However, he does break up his chapters into sections – switching from one scene to another. So I've taken to stopping reading at one of these breaks when I need to, rather than finishing the chapter.

Anyway, *Amongst Our Weapons* is highly recommended, but you should really start with the first book in the series, *Rivers of London* (see TWJO 228), to get the full experience.

Start-up

Time for a new all-reader game and a return to this one. I have cribbed the rules from the *Variable Pig* website. You can find the originals (with lots of variants) at: <http://variablepig.org/rules/bypop.html>

Each turn the GM lists six categories and a letter. For each category, players name something that fits it and begins with the initial letter. They score points equal to the number of people who give the same answer. Most points at the end wins.

Example: The initial letter is A and the category is cities in Holland. 13 people give Amsterdam as their answer and score 13 points each, 6 people suggest Alkmaar and score 6 points each, 3 suggest Arnhem and score 3 points each.

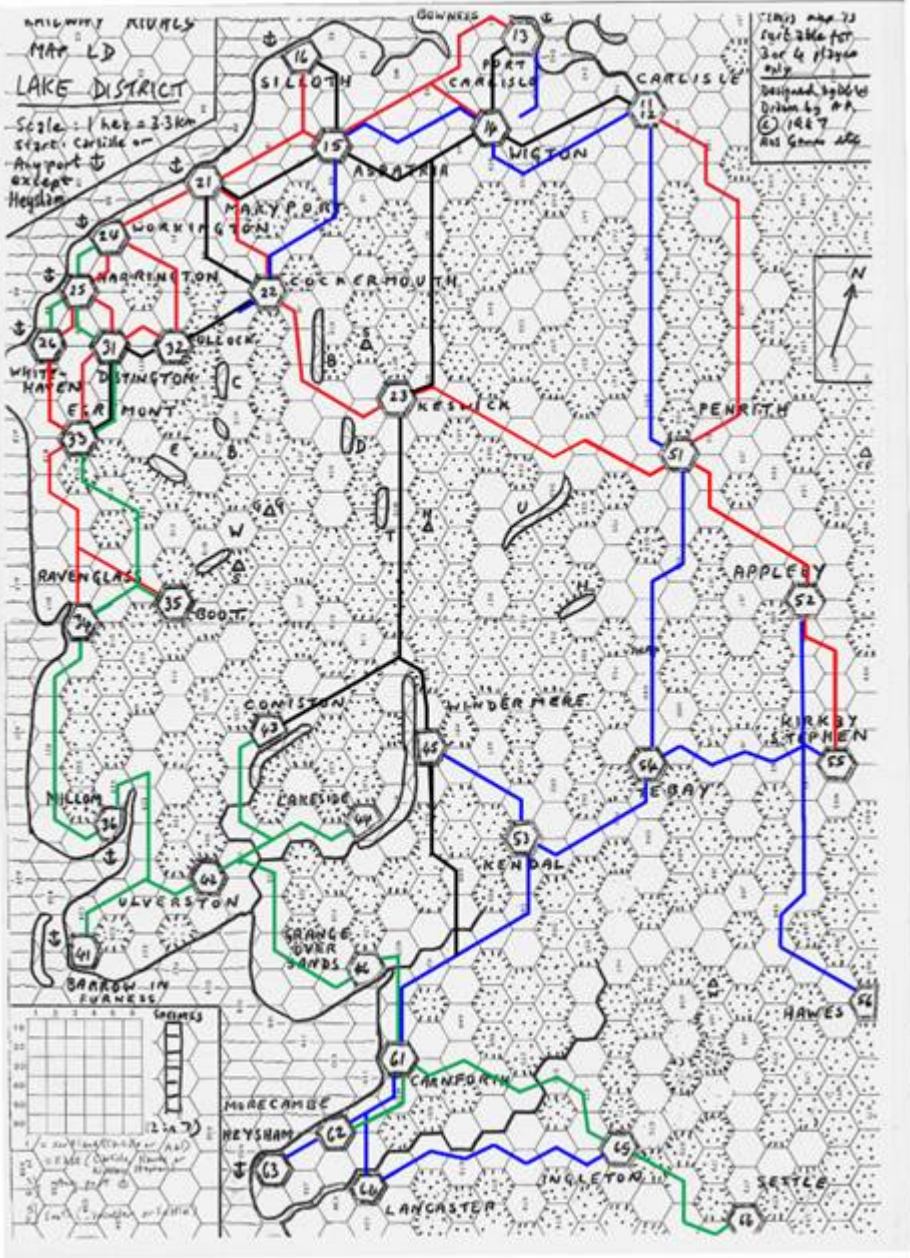

April 1677 (398)

Spring finally arrives in Paris and the flowers cheer everybody up – even those with cold steel in their hands, heading for a (potentially) deadly rendezvous. First up, Barthélemy Chifflet is taking his rapier to face a similar weapon in the hands of Beaumes de Venise. Beaumes is both the bigger of the two and more skilled, but Barthélemy has Percival Puffington to bolster his courage. Barthélemy tries to stop the attacks he expects, but Beaumes settles for a standard lunge. This goes straight through Barthélemy's block to score first blood. Miffed, Barthélemy responds with a lunge of his own. Beaumes ignores the wound and lunges again, this time eliciting a surrender from his opponent.

After cleaning his sword, Beaumes trots round the corner to his meeting with Henri De Flection. Henri is another rapier user and, again, more slightly built and less skilled than Beaumes. Beaumes follows the same strategy as his last duel: lunge and lunge again. Unlike Barthélemy, Henri gets his parry right and stops the first lunge, drawing first blood with his riposte. However, Beaumes continues with his lunges. The third attack meets Henri's own lunge and is followed by simultaneous cuts. Henri surrenders.

Next up are Charles Etfeevor of the 13th Fusiliers versus Hugo Furst of the 13th Fusiliers. Ah. Realising their predicament, neither man turns up for their encounter, preferring the loss of status to the disgrace that would follow a duel. Hugo treats his comrade to breakfast instead.

Arent Hayes, seconded by François de Blanchefort, has the sole advantage of using a sabre against the rapier of Beau Taux, whose second is Ian Dediette. Arent starts with a parry, but Beau lunges afterwards to score first. Arent launches into a furious slash, hitting Beau with the slash and then a cut. This last blow lands at

the same time as a slash from Beau. The damage from the sabre has told, though, and Beau surrenders.

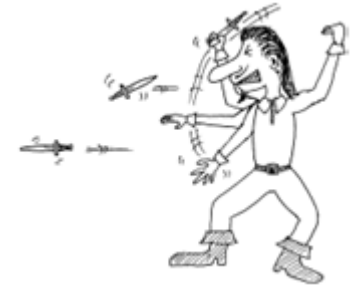
He's now sufficiently injured to be able to decline any further fights, disappointing Botte Le Chimiste, François de Blanchefort and Vaux de Fon.

Balzac Slapdash's old injuries are such that he doesn't even need a duel this month to be able to skip his meeting with Con Stantinople.

This leaves us with just Louis Severin Descartes's challenge to "Tiny" Thierry Toothpick. Paris voted that Louis had cause by a large margin (16:1) and the two men duly turn up at the appointed time. Thierry has heard that, first, his opponent "wishes this to be to first blood" and, second, that Louis would prefer him not to fight with daggers. However, the rules are strict and both men must use their nominated weapon. As a compromise (!), Thierry agrees not to throw any of his knives.

Both men are of small, nay, tiny stature, emphasising the difference between Louis's sabre and Thierry's dagger. Elroi le Flingue and Jacques Hatt second Louis, while Maurice Danseur supports Thierry. Maurice makes it clear that "I do not support his having had the Marquis [Severin Descartes] arrested and tried for treason. I hope to see good displays of honour and will frown upon any displays of knife throwing (this is the field of honour, not a Circus ring!)." Both duellists launch into a furious slash to start.

The sabre cuts into Thierry while his own blade swishes through the air between them. They spin round and cut. Again, Thierry takes a wound while his weapon isn't even close to his opponent. Yes, he has forgotten to allow for the length (or lack thereof) of his dagger! Thierry surrenders while he's still conscious and his Tangerines quickly hustle him off for medical attention.



To Brigadier or not to Brigadier

Sticking with Louis SD, he has an eye on being Brigadier of Third Foot, rather than a Minister without Portfolio. Accordingly, he has asked the current Brigadier to step down. His request is given some force by the support of Greg de Bécqueur, Jacques Hatt and Rick Shaw. Faced with this pressure, the Brigadier quits. Rick then throws his weight behind Louis's application for the post and he is duly appointed Brigadier.

In a similar vein, "Tiny" Thierry has asked the Horse Guards Brigadier to resign. Balzac Slapdash and Thibault Chanson de Skye weigh in to support this. However, Botte Le Chimiste uses his influence in defence of the Brigadier, who stands firm against Thierry's demand.

Charles PiedLuminaire has applied to be Brigadier of the Dragoons without apparently noticing that this position is taken. So next month will be about getting the incumbent out. However, in expectation of this post, Charles has already resigned as Second Division Adjutant.

Hugo Furst offers Henri De Flection the opportunity of being his Aide. Neither seems to have spotted Henri has the rank of Captain and thus is not eligible to be the Aide to a Brigadier-General. What Hugo needs is a promotion (before Henri gets one) so that he can then ask him to be Aide to a Lieutenant-General. So he volunteers the Second Foot Brigade for some action. This comes as something of a surprise to members of the 13th (Charles Etfeevor and Henri) and 53rd (Beau Taux and Sebastiane Blanc-Chevaux) Fusiliers.

Crown Prince Cuirassier CO François de Blanchefort wants to get rid of the senior Major in his regiment – presumably so that a more junior officer can be promoted. He deploys some influence to make this happen, but it's not enough.

No favours are needed to get rid of the Dragoon Brigade Major. Maurice Danseur, who holds the post, resigns from the Grand Duke Max's, losing both his rank and his appointment. He is quickly signed up for the Dragoon Guards by Balzac Slapdash and buys his way back to the rank of Major – thanks to a substantial gift from his new CO. This is in the wake of Thierry Toothpick purchasing the Lt-Colonel's rank.

In Government circles, Frank X Change quits his job as Minister of Justice a couple of months early. The new Minister of State, Rick Shaw, keeps him in government as a Minister without Portfolio.

Marching for the Low Countries alongside the Second Foot will be First Foot Brigade, whose members are given their marching orders by Brigadier Percival Puffington. This takes the Picardy Musketeers (including Barthélemy Chifflet) and the Royal Marines (with Chemin de Fer – as Brigade Major – and Marcel Hatch Dupree) away from Paris.



Not to be outdone, Pierre De Terre volunteers his squadron of the Grand Duke Max's and Maximilien de Piquemaire and Steve De Sade come along with that. Maximilien pauses only to repay his loan – something the moneylenders really appreciate from debtors who may die soon.

Parties without horses

The Jacques As Memorial Stakes horse race is clearly the major social event this month. However, it's not until the end of April, so there's plenty of time for other parties. We kick off with Louis Severin Descartes and Edna Bucquette holding court at the Fleur de Lys. Half a dozen socialites attend, most with their lady friends in tow. Elroi noisily congratulates the host for his victory in court and offers schemes to ensure the downfall of the Tangerines. There's no trouble between the guests, but Maurice Danseur deserts Belle Epoque to pick a fight with his regimental enemies. Maurice is in Grand Duke Max's and two members of the Queen's Own are also in the club – Justin Thyme and “Tiny” Thierry Toothpick are both members and the subjects of Maurice's challenges.



At the same time, Thibault Chanson de Skye (who's rescheduled his loans) and Katy Did welcome Con Stantinople (with Anne Tique) and Justin Saad for a peaceful drink.

Come the second week and Louis SD sees his guests dwindle to Greg and Jacques. A whole new bunch of people (apart from Elroi le Flingue who's switched hosts) are in the Fleur as the guests of Louis Renault and Maggie Nifisent to discuss campaign strategies for Third Army. Elroi is one of the few to provide much input to the discussion, offering “daring and impractical suggestions for the Third Army this campaign season: ‘What if you imported elephants from Africa and mounted cannon on them?’” There are no disputes here but, in Hunter's, Con Stantinople and Maurice Danseur argue the relative merits of their opposed regiments. While Justin Saad is left outside Hunter's as he's early for the next week's Easter Egg hunt. “I'm here for the Easter Egg hunt,” he tells everybody.

Said event is hosted by Con and Anne (wearing a substantial bonnet covered in yellow flowers) with a prize for the lady with the best Easter bonnet as well as for whoever finds the most eggs. Lucy Fur, accompanying Elroi, wears a bonnet topped with peacock plumes woven into the shape of a fleur-de-lis. Maggie Nifisent, on Louis Renault's arm, has another ornate assembly of flowers (see Press), but also wears a strong perfume to counter the acrid scent of the yellow Ragwort. Belle Epoque wears “a bonnet in the shape of a hatching egg with a little chick's head peeping out”, which beau Maurice is very proud of. Steve De Sade claims Thomasina Tancenjin is wearing “the most ostentatious Easter bonnet Paris has ever seen”. However, it's Maggie's cleverly composed display that wins the prize – a very large, very solid chocolate egg. Con seems happy to have his regimental enemies attend, which means another exchange between him and Maurice. Balzac Slapdash joins in on Maurice's side and Justin Thyme backs up Con.

Racing with horses

And then the runners and riders line up for this year's Jacques As Memorial Stakes with his Highness the Dauphin putting up a generous prize pot of 5,000 crowns. For the betting man, the early favourites are Balzac Slapdash and Justin Thyme. The Prince himself starts the race, dropping a fragrant handkerchief from his prime viewing position in the main grandstand, amidst the spectating ladies.

The dash to the first corner sees Con Stantinople (riding Blinky this time) take the lead, half a length up on “Tiny” Thierry Toothpick. Justin Thyme is on Thierry's tail with Louis Severin Descartes just behind him. Arent Hayes is just in front of the pack. The first row of this consists of Balzac, Elroi le Flingue, Maurice Danseur and Ian Dediette. Then it's Greg de Bécqueur, Zeold von Tu and Jacques Hatt, closely followed by François de Blanchefort, Justin Saad and Louis Renault. Botte Le Chimiste and Thibault Chanson de Skye are at the back.

Con gives his horse its head and it streaks down the back straight to enter the final corner over two lengths clear. Despite being in front of the pack of the pack, Thierry's horse seems to have taken a knock in the corner and can only trot. He is passed by Arent and Louis SD, both at top speed, then the cantering Justin T and the galloping Ian and Maurice, now beside Justin. Balzac, Greg and Jacques come alongside Thierry with Louis R just behind. Elroi is another whose mount is struggling. He's next, beside Thibault, who's charging hard. Zeold has dropped back to join François and they've been caught by Rick. Botte is still at the back, but has at least caught up with Justin S.

Onto the final straight and it's a sprint to the line. Seeing the big gap behind him, Con eases off, cantering to a win by two lengths. Arent and Louis SD can get no more from their horses and drop back. It's Maurice who hurtles past them to claim second place. Just half a length behind all the way to the line is Balzac. Ian catches Louis SD on the line for joint fourth, and Justin T is alongside Arent as sixth equal.

Then it's Elroi, Greg, Louis R and Thibault – the latter two finally finding some pace. Trotting up next are Jacques and Thierry, chatting as their horses practically march in step. François, Rick and Zeold are spared last place which goes, jointly, to Botte and Justin S.

Dismounted and cleaned up a bit, the riders rejoin their ladies (in most cases) to be greeted by the Dauphin. Already wearing hers, Lucy hands Elroi his “very flamboyant Easterhat”. However, Prinny is not so welcoming to those who haven't participated. Thus Armand Alsace and Vaux de Fon are given the cold shoulder. Beaumes de Venise is aware of his Highness's preferences and watched the race from the cheap seats where he finds a whole group in orange uniforms and face paint cheering on “Tiny” Thierry.

There are thin pickings for the footpads this month. Their victims are Ian Dediette, but he's spent his cash, and Beaumes de Venise, who has only a couple of crowns left. It's mixed results for those socialites who go courting: Henri DuShite succeeds (bad news on its way to Camille de Polignac), while Rick Shaw fails.

The strangest sight in Paris this month is a mob (okay, it's not really a mob, more a large group) of orange people congregating outside the Louvre. This is, of course, “Tiny” Thierry Toothpick's entourage (of “Public Safety Ministry employees”) and he is at their head, demanding an audience with the King “upon a matter of national security!” Thierry harangues the guards on duty: “I used to be your Major until recently”; “I'm a Lieutenant Colonel now, you know”; There's skullduggery afoot”; “His Majesty must see me, I'm the Commissioner of Public Safety!” When Thierry's entreaties meet blank faces, he starts ranting that “Cuckpowder must have bewitched His Majesty into becoming a recluse... poisoned his mind against his ministers...”



To Cambrai!

The French offensive against the Spanish Netherlands continues, bolstered by substantial reinforcements. The focus this month is Cambrai, which gets the attentions of First and Second Foot Brigades as well as the Guards. The major success is the Cardinal's Guard, storming the ramparts to go looting. Frank X Change, commanding, gathers nearly a thousand crowns worth of loot. This is on top of his double Mention in Despatches (“Outstanding!” “One for His Eminence!”). However, number two in the regiment, Lieutenant-Colonel Come Asiouar, grabs twice as much booty – though not quite worth two thousand crowns. His own MiD (“That's the way to do it!”) brings him an Earldom as well.

The Royal Foot Guards meet stiff resistance for a change. All boss man Camille de Polignac gets is a Dear John letter. There's a Mention for Lt-Col Martin de Garnache ("Did better than his boss"). And a similar one for senior Major Hector William Boone, who becomes a Baron on the strength of it. Junior Major Neville Moore just gets a MiD, while there's no reward for Captain Felipe Savant.



Rebuffed from their own attack, the King's Musketeers retire to lick their wounds. CO Claude de Nord is Mentioned ("At least he rallied his men"). As is Captain Hugo Serre. There's a perfunctory Mention in Despatches for Guard Brigadier Terence Cuckpowder: "Could have been worse".

In First Foot, the Royal Marines make some progress – enough that Lt-Col Marcel Hatch Dupree is able to loot well over a thousand crowns' worth of goodies. Not so the Picardy Musketeers, but there's still a (brief) Mention ("Standing firm") for Major Barthélemy Chifflet, followed by a Knighthood. Brigadier Percival Puffington sees his rank (Brigadier-General) made permanent and Brigade Major Chemin de Fer gets a Mention.

The 53rd Fusiliers are the second success of the month, bringing some glory to Second Foot Brigade. Both Captains, Beau Taux and Sebastiane Blanc-Chevaux, receive Mentions in Despatches ("Good work"). Their comrades in the 13th don't do as well, but there's still a MiD for Captain Henri De Flection and promotion for Captain Charles Etfeevor (who can afford the extra horses required for his new rank). Both of those rewards come to Brigadier Hugo Furst as well. He is promoted to full Brigadier-General alongside his Mention and monopolises the looting to gain fifteen hundred crowns' worth. And a Knighthood comes his way to boot.

Cavalry support comes from the Archduke Leopold Cuirassiers and the Princess Louisa Light Dragoons. The Cuirassiers' patrols are uneventful, but commander Hugh Jeneaux appears in the Despatches ("Very necessary work"). Conversely, the Dragoons are in the right place to chase down fleeing Spaniards – and their plunder. Leader Charles PiedLuminaire seizes well over a thousand crowns' worth of rewards, but Lt-Col Dee Jean Aise amasses a full two thousand worth.

Second squadron of Grand Duke Max's Dragoons is attached to Frontier regiment 1 and brings them success in battle. Major Pierre De Terre is Mentioned twice ("Dragoons!" "With the Frontier troops?"), while Captain Maximilien de Piquemaire concentrates on looting (getting over two thousand crowns' worth) and Captain Steve De Sade takes promotion to Major. Plus fifteen hundred crowns' worth of plunder that more than covers his purchase of two more horses. ❖
